Kansas and Canada: Partners in Trade



Consul General Sylvain Fabi

Sylvain Fabi (BBA, Bishop's University, 1988) joined the Consulate General of Canada in Denver in October 2020. His career with Global Affairs Canada has spanned various geographic and trade policy divisions, and included assignments abroad in Moscow, Havana, Santiago, Jamaica and the Bahamas where he served as High Commissioner for Canada. Before becoming Consul General in Denver, he was Executive Director, U.S. Transboundary Affairs Division (2017 to 2020). He was also Canada's chief negotiator for the modernization of the Columbia River Treaty with the United States (2017-2023). In his current role as Canada's Consul General in the U.S. Mountain West Region, Mr. Fabi oversees a team of 18 people who work within Colorado, Kansas, Montana, Utah and Wyoming to strengthen trade and economic ties; enhance political, academic and cultural links; and assist Canadians visiting or living in the five-state territory.
